

Surviving Texas Railroad Stations

Abernathy: The passenger station originally built by the Santa Fe here still stands.

Abilene: The passenger stations originally built by the Wichita Valley Railroad, Texas & Pacific Railway and Union Pacific here still stand. Also, the UP's freight depot here remains.

Acme: The passenger station originally built by the Quanah, Acme & Pacific Railway here still stands, moved to Quanah.

Adrian: The passenger station originally built by the Rock Island here still stands.

Albany: The passenger station originally built by the Texas Central Railroad here still stands.

Aledo: The passenger station originally built by the Texas & Pacific Railway here still stands.

Alice: The passenger stations originally built by the Texas Mexican Railway and Texas & New Orleans Railroad here still stand.

Alpine: The passenger stations originally built by the Kansas City, Missouri & Orient Railway and Texas & New Orleans Railroad here still stand, the latter used as an Amtrak stop.

Alvarado: The passenger station originally built by the Santa Fe here still stands, used as a museum.

Alvin: The passenger station originally built by the Santa Fe here still stands, restored.

Amarillo: The passenger stations originally built by the Santa Fe and Fort Worth & Denver Railway here still stand. Also, the Santa Fe's freight depot here still stands.

Anthony: The passenger station originally built by the Santa Fe here still stands.

Anton: The passenger station originally built by the Santa Fe here still stands, home of the Anton County Museum.

Athens: The passenger station originally built by the SLSW here still stands, used as a business.

Atlanta: The passenger station originally built by the International & Great Northern Railway here still stands, restored, used as a business.

Austin: The passenger stations originally built by the MoPac and H&TC here still stand, the former used as an Amtrak stop.
